haven't taken up ice fishing. Does that make me less of a Minnesotan after almost 22 years here?


Winter is a great opportunity for introspection and remembering that we need to approach our lives with intention. I mean, you need to watch where you step and how you tread. Hopefully we will

After political conflicts in Nicaragua in 2018 halted our travels back and forth—and caused all U.S. airlines to cancel service to Nicaragua—we are again going to have a UBC delegation visiting our friends and families in Managua and León.

Deidre Druk, Jean Lubke, and Pastor Doug will travel to Nicaragua Jan. 26 – Feb. 6. They will visit friends at First Baptist Managua, see the mission health work of AMOS, stay in family homes in León, and conduct teacher training at Colegio Bautista. In addition, they visit the communities of San Carlos and La Gallina to see the results of the community development work of PML (and buy pizza and ice cream from the youth businesses!), have time to rekindle old friendships and build new relationships with the new pastor of Second Baptist León, and bring greetings and gifts from Anielka and Francisco to their families!

They are excited to travel there again and hope that this will signal a return to our regular delegation visits.





Streaming Technicians Needed

COVID kicked us into the 21st century with live streaming capabilities, a TV monitor on the front sanctuary wall, cameras hanging from the side and back balconies, and a complex set of soundboards, computer monitors, and screens moved

from the ushers' closet and now living with David in the organ loft.



We have tried unsuccessfully for the past 6 months to find a person who was willing to be hired as our worship streaming technician, so the Worship Planning Team, Personnel Committee, and the UBC Council have a new idea that we will try for the next 6 months.



Anyone who is interested can "apply" for the paid consultant position by sending me a letter of interest including your relevant qualifications and experience. I will then send you the appropriate payroll paperwork. The

position description link is here.

The position will be paid \$40/event (Sunday morning service, Christmas Eve service, funeral, etc.). Up to 2 people can be paid for any given event.

Individuals are welcome to volunteer their time and talents to UBC in this manner as well! We do want to acknowledge the skills and commitment needed to bring this service to our members and friends. FYI - Francisco Diaz will continue to volunteer his time and talents as he does not have a U.S. work visa.

I will be setting up a calendar, similar to the Worship Leaders, so all who are interested can sign up for particular dates; then everyone who is involved in leading worship can know who will be the technician for any given event. We will be reviewing this process in the spring as we work to set our budgets for the 2023-2024 program year.

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

UBC's budgeted operating income for 2022-23 is \$365,885. This includes the final adjusted amount of \$22,875 carryforward from 2021-22 fiscal year and the Foundation distribution of \$64,720.

Most of our income (52%) comes from the pledges made by members. As of Dec.

24, pledges are running a surplus of more than \$10,000 due to several folks re-paying their pledge.

Expected annual rental income for 2022-23 of \$74,000 is 20% of our budget. This is a large increase over last year's \$60,000. This item has a surplus as our largest renter received a grant and has pre-paid some rent.



Other gifts and miscellaneous income provide 4% of our budget. These are mostly gifts made by pledgers beyond their pledge or from people who did not pledge.

The Foundation distribution is 18%, which includes 9% (\$32,053) for the

property manager position. The Foundation funds are transferred to the UBC checking account as needed by the treasurer.

UBC's Recent Discernment History

Could it be time for another period of "discernment" at UBC? To set the stage for community discussion, the Council asked Jean Lubke to recount the story of past UBC discernment efforts. As you'll see, embarking on an intentional discernment process is a time-honored tradition at UBC that has been undertaken for various reasons at various times.

"Discernment" according to Merriam-Webster is "an act of perceiving...being able to grasp and comprehend what is obscure." In some Christian contexts, "discernment" is defined as "a decision-making process by which God helps an individual to reach the best decision that can lead to future action." (pray.com)

In my time at UBC, there have been several occasions where we felt the need to stop and take time to discern the direction God wanted our congregation to go next. (I'm sure that between 1850 and 1980 there were also many such opportunities, but I'll have to leave the telling of those to the historians!)

In the spring of 1991, we were in the middle of our interim with Rev. Jim Ketcham following the long tenure of Rev. Lee Freeman. The congregation had made a significant turn from clergy-focused, centralized leadership to lay-focused leadership (including the creation of the role of Worship Leader for our services). We were in the middle of the search process for our next pastor and felt the need to clarify who and what we were.

We created our UBC Mission statement (by congregational wordsmithing!) that we still use today. Periodically we've looked at it to see if it needs updating, but it has held its relevance for 30 years.

UBC's Mission Statement - May 26, 1991

The Mission of University Baptist Church is: to be a loving and inclusive community; seeking faith, joy, action; nurtured by the biblical tradition, the teachings of Christ, and God's continuing revelation.

In the Fall of 1998, we were facing more changes. Our old building was needing significant updating; Rev. Dr. Nadean Bishop was preparing to retire; and neighborhood churches were going through changes to their old buildings.

The Mormon church next door tore down its large dark, gothic building and built the current single-story church with a large parking lot and satellite dish. Andrew-Riverside Presbyterian's exterior wall collapsed in 2002 causing them to demolish their Gothic structure, creating a community garden and moving into a storefront.

There were concerns at UBC about a congregation of our size being able to keep an old building going and the wisdom of doing so.

So in the Fall of 1998, we began a year-long process to determine the future direction of our congregation and the use of our building.



We conducted focus groups and held forums and retreats. We created three discernment groups: 1) Community / Identity (external); 2) Needs of the UBC Community (internal); and 3) Building Facilities. We identified 5 options for moving forward:

Options:

- 1 Stay in bldg, maintain and upgrade bldg
- 2 Stay in bldg. provide minimal maintenance
- 3 Merge with other congregation (leave bldg)
- 4 Sell bldg & rent or build elsewhere
- 5 Sell bldg and disband

The groups brought their reports to the congregation; we discussed them at several forums and finally voted for Option #1. Then we created goals and action steps to be able to successfully stay in the building.

We created the CISA (Capital Improvement Set-Aside) fund that draws 30% of our annual Foundation distribution to be used for long-term improvements for the building (not minor repairs). We hired our new pastor (Rev. Doug Donley) and our music director based on the input and goals from the reports.

We started a "burn-out" task force to look at our burdensome organizational structure. And we launched another capital campaign for the major building projects of installing an elevator, replacing the windows, and upgrading the electrical systems. (Our previous Capital Campaign "Renewal for the 90's" ten years before, had rebuilt the front of the sanctuary including the ramp, rebuilt the front room of the office and the adjacent kitchen, and renovated the lounge.)

After Pastor Doug came, we were ready to address the problem of congregation burn-out. We had 6 Boards, each with 6 members. Each member had to also serve on either the Church Council, the Personnel Committee, the Nominating Committee, or the Pastoral Relations Committee. We were regularly arm-twisting our new members to "fill a spot" (a great way to lose new members!).

So from 2001 to 2002 we investigated other structures in churches of our size, held multiple forums to determine the items of critical importance to our ministry, and finally had a congregational meeting to approve our current streamlined, passion-based structure – reducing the number of committee / board seats from 87 to 29, plus a dozen core ministry leaders. We reduced the Council from 15 to 7 and eliminated all of the Boards. We wanted our energy and efforts going to doing ministry rather than meetings.

In early 2006, after two long years of painful battles with the Mid-America Region of ABC (Minnesota /

lowa) over UBC's Baptist right to ordain anyone whom we determined was called to ministry, regardless of their sexual orientation, we lost the war when the region voted to change the bylaws to "never ordain a homosexual." We were faced with the imminent possibility of being "dis-fellowshipped" (ejected from regional membership), thus cutting ties with the ABC. Among other problems, this would have jeopardized the retirement incomes of all of our congregational members who were active or retired clergy or missionaries.

Together with Judson Baptist (Mpls.), we held forums, meetings, brought in the Regional



Ministers of the Chicago area and the Rochester / Genesee region, and ultimately voted (separately) for both congregations to join ABC/RGR in Rochester, NY.

In early 2008 after we had recovered from the previous years' trauma and had enjoyed a year of calm, we were ready, again, to discern our congregation's future. We held structured dinners for eight in homes and forums. We identified our values and goals:

The VALUES of University Baptist Church are:

- Social justice, outreach, and education advocacy and a voice for the voiceless
- Inclusion regardless of color, race, orientation, gender, age
- Strong community
- Care, respect, and support for members
- · Peace and anti-violence
- Baptist principles of individual and congregational autonomy, Biblical inquiry, associations
- Creative worship and quality music

As a result of this work, we also decided to create a stronger link with our sister church in León, Nicaragua and begin our delegation exchanges. We also explored the use of our building as a homeless shelter for Minneapolis.
