Transformative Work

Www ith the election over, the work continues to spread the Gospel of peace. It behooves us to pay particular attention to our transgender and immigrant friends and family members. The new administration has promised voters to villify and punish these two groups among others for the crime of being whom they are. Our stance as allies

and advocates is increasingly important. We don't know quite yet how these promised policies will play out, but we do know of the fear and trepidation that our trans and immigrant friends express.

I'm heartened that we will be housing asylum seekers during the month of December as a part of the Faithful Hospitality program Interfaith Action of Greater St. Paul. It seems like a good hands-on way to provide balm for weary souls. I look forward to finding out how interacting with these people will open our hearts and minds to imagine and work for a safer and more humane world.

While Minnesota has been a sanctuary state for immigrants, trans folks and people seeking reproductive health care, our state cannot and should not have to carry this

burden/opportunity by ourselves. That's the longterm work in which we will be engaged for the foreseeable future. In the meantime, please hold each other in prayer. Support each other as we will need all-hands-on-deck. And open your hearts and minds to the continuing revelation of God (as our church mission statement reads). I for one am so grateful for this brave and transformative community that takes the need for healing action seriously.

THRIVE Sociologist Presentations

UBC is one of 26 Baptist churches participating in the Alliance of Baptists' 5-year THRIVE Project. THRIVE objectives:

- Explore and understand race-based privilege and oppression.
- Gain greater clarity about the Alliance's commitment to racial justice.
- Draw on Baptist theological and ecclesial traditions to dislodge white-biased structures of injustice and enact racially aware practices.

On October 22 and November 12, the THRIVE sociologists—Gerardo Marti, Mark Mulder, and Kevin Dougherty—presented some of their findings, *When White Churches Commit to Racial Justice: Lessons*. Here are links to Part 1 and Part 2 of the presentations.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING DECEMBER 1, 11: 30 a.m.

Throughout our discernment process, one recommendation was constant - we need a person whose training and expertise are in marketing and communication to help us do what we have not yet been able to do ourselves - get out the message of who we are to people who are looking for a church community like ours. Hiring a marketing / communication professional became one of the main action items for this year under our Direction #1: Refocusing People Power.

The eventual goal for engaging a marketing / communication professional is to communicate about UBC and our work to people and organizations who might want to join our ministries. We see, as a long-term goal, an increase in resources: 1) people (volunteers and potential members), 2) financial funding to help the financial solvency of UBC, and 3) organizations (i.e. other non-profits) with whom we can collaborate with in ministry. The work of marketing and communication will be ongoing, but to start, we are proposing a one-year position with re-evaluation after the first year.

The Personnel Committee took this direction and created the attached job description, which has been approved by the Council. This is not a position for which we already have funding. Therefore, there will be a congregational meeting on Sunday, December 1 at 11:30 to discuss this proposal and make decisions about the funding.

Handel's Messiah From London to Minneapolis

In 1741 when Handel wrote the Messiah, London was a pretty gritty place. There was tremendous poverty. It was not uncommon to come upon a newborn or young infant abandoned and dying on a garbage heap in a street.

The London Foundling Hospital was established to care for unwanted children. I have been there. It still exists, though as a playground site for London's children and a museum. Of course, many women who left their babies there wanted to keep them but couldn't. There is a very poignant exhibit of the talismans that they left with their babies hoping that they would be able to identify them and reunite later when they could support them.

George Frideric Handel's Messiah was a key source of income for London's Foundling Hospital. Handel was a benefactor and governor of the hospital, and he conducted annual performances of Messiah to raise money for the children. He continued to do so until his death in 1759, personally conducting about 36 performances.

On December 8 there is a Messiah Sing with the Minnesota Chorale at St. Olaf Catholic Church in Minneapolis. Several from UBC are going including Ty Wottrich who sings in the Chorale. Registration is

requested. Attendance is free, \$20/person donation suggested. For more information, see <u>https://www.mnchorale.org/</u>

We should remember that originally, Handel used profits from this to save babies who would otherwise have died. And we should remember that babies and their parents need our continuing support so that a child does not need to be given up in order to eat.

The Roots Cellar Concert Series

There's a gem of a music listening room right in Dinkytown, near the University of Minnesota's Minneapolis campus. The concert series known as "The Roots Cellar" is named for the roots music it features, as well as for the lower level of University Baptist Church, where it's held.

The "roots" also go way back to the beginnings of the congregation, when they performed baptisms in the Mississippi River! Founded in 1850, eight years before Minnesota became a state, the congregation went through several names and locations before they built their present church at 1219 University Ave SE, Minneapolis, in 1921. Throughout its 174 years, the congregation has been characterized by progressive theology and a strong commitment to peace and justice issues. Early members were involved in the abolitionist movement and women's suffrage. The 1960s were marked by programs of social action and issues involvement. Pastor Kenneth Huyck marched in Selma, Alabama, for civil and voting rights back then.



The Roots Cellar Concert Series is the brainchild of Pastor Doug Donley, who has led the congregation since 2001. He started the series as a way to further their mission to reach out to the community, providing meaningful music. Doug

told me, "It's all about welcoming the larger

community in. Our building is a resource that doesn't belong to us, but belongs to the community, and so it should be shared by the community."

Doug said that "Dinkytown has been a mecca for decades for singer-songwriters." He lamented that the smaller venues with more affordable tickets prices have disappeared. He continued, "That was the kind of place we needed to accentuate and support and this is the kind of music that I really like. And so, a lot of it is self-interest; I get to hear the artists that I really like, and get my friends around to hear it too. We started this whole thing to support the community of musicians and people seeking to hear great music at an affordable price in a really informal setting."

The series showcases an eclectic mix of traditional and roots musicians ranging from blues to bluegrass, folk, and Americana.

The venue is ADA accessible, with an elevator available to access the concert hall in the lower level, and snacks are available. You can learn more and get tickets at https://www.ubcmn.org/roots-cellar-music

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Most of our income (58%) comes from pledges made by members. Our pledges are running behind but I expect that to change as people tend to give more in December.

Rentals are running ahead thanks to sporadic rentals of the gym and assembly hall. Rental income of

\$72,004 covers approximately 20% of our budget.

Other gifts and miscellaneous income provide 4% of our budget and the UBC Foundation distribution is 18%, which includes (\$34,401) for the property manager position.



Financial Updates

The Council accepted the 2023-2024 year-end financial reports at our November Council meeting. We ended the year with a deficit of less than \$2K, which was great news considering we thought we might have a deficit of closer to \$55K. We were helped by under-spending and ERTC (Employee Retention Tax Credit) funds from the federal government, a holdover from the COVID years.



As the pie charts show, personnel costs are our highest expenses (70% of budget for human resources

expenses for pastor, music director, administrative assistant, property manager, janitor, choir soloists, child care workers, and livestreaming technician). Building expenses (insurance. utilities. maintenance, lawn care and snow removal - minus staff and capital projects) represent 22% of our annual expenses. Leaving the remaining expenses (8%) for ministry and outreach.

Individual / family pledges continue to be our largest source of income

(51%); rentals at 19% nearly cover the 22% building expenses; income from the Foundation (15%) is used to cover the Property Manager salary, capital improvements, and help balance the general operating budget.

We will take a detailed look at the 2024-2025 financial progress at our Mid-Year Budget Review at the forum on Sunday, January 26. If you'd like to see any interim financial reports, please ask Denise Roy or another member of the Council. - Jean Lubke, UBC President

FORUMS

Annessa Ihde of Faithful Hospitality led a discussion and Q&A at the forum on **November 10** about families seeking asylum here in the Twin Cities and the role of sanctuary churches. UBC will house people in December.


