Be a Voice for Justice

he election is finally upon us. I want to revisit the opening paragraph from a sermon in September. It still feels relevant. Here's what I said:

I was at a clergy gathering this past week pulled together by ISAIAH, a faith-based community organizing organization. We broke up into pairs and talked about how we were doing in preparation for the

election. How were we doing and how were our congregations doing. Now, this was a few days after Tuesday's debate, so things are fresh in our minds.

I was paired with Rev. Susie Hayward from Mayflower UCC in South Minneapolis. We talked about how our communities are very similar. Most of us know who we are going to vote for and have for a long time. I'm not sure the debate changed any minds as we remain in our thought and cultural and belief bubbles. She was most concerned about the aftermath of the election. How do we protect our people when the inevitable violence erupts?

Thinking about today's scripture and sermon, I got thinking that we often confuse elected officials with saviors. If we just elect this person, we'll be saved. You've heard this language, haven't you? I said, "We're not voting for a savior." She countered, "Really, we're voting for a pharaoh." A benevolent,



malleable pharaoh or a pharaoh who exacts revenge on his enemies. But a pharaoh either way. Too many of our churches are what William Barber calls chaplains of empire. Is that how Jesus would want us to act? She said that the election is not about the work of liberation. At best, it's harm reduction—causing the least amount of damage. It's not about liberation.

So now that the election is upon us, we certainly need to get out and vote. But the work does not stop with the counting of the ballots. The work continues regardless of who wins. There will still be a war in Ukraine, in Gaza, in Lebanon, in the West Bank, in Israel. There will still be inequity. There will still be people who are polarized. The church's role is to be a voice for justice, for peace, for compassion and for mercy. As we rejoice and/or mourn the election results, may we also commit ourselves to bridging the gaps that have too easily opened between us. May we get on with standing with and for the outcasts in our midst. May we envision and work for a country that is ethical, merciful and just.

We are currently in Year 4 of the grant, a period for "observation" in which a follow-up survey of cohort congregations is planned to "assess the impact of initiatives for addressing racialized structures, from individual awareness to organizational operations." Faithful Hospitality

In December, UBC will be partnering with several other faith communities, the University Area Sanctuary Coalition and local students to house asylum-seeking families at UBC. A program of Interfaith Action, Faithful Hospitality partners with churches to house up to 24 people seeking asylum for a month at a time. Annessa Ihde from Faithful Hospitality will be our forum speaker on November 10 and will be able to answer questions.

Guests stay overnight at the church and then go to a day center where they get all of their meals and have other programs. We'll have our guests stay largely on the second floor (tentatively the lounge, nursery, youth room).

A Great Summer Season in the Garden

Irst, thanks for a successful season in the garden go to the core team of faithful workers: Trish Donley, Chris Follett, and Betsy Kerr, who showed up virtually every Thursday morning to tend to whatever needed doing. Key to accomplishing certain big tasks were additional timely helpers Felix and Dorcal, Erik and Ivan, and Pastor Doug. And of course, appreciation to Patrick Mavity for regular mowing as needed, for keeping us stocked with yard waste bags and hoses, and many other unseen tasks.

Thanks also go to the Creator for the abundant rain of the spring and early summer, which relieved us of any watering duty for most of the season. The rain, plus the exceptionally warm winter, resulted in abundant growth and blooms throughout the garden. Of course, this also included weeds! Thanks to Chris for her untiring efforts to eradicate every unwelcome growth, including weeds growing in the cracks of the parking lot concrete!



We were anxious to see the results of our dormant seeding of the lawn with a bee lawn seed mix late last fall. Early assessments were auite uncertain, as new weeds appeared

places and some large bare spots remained. However, with time, the weeds were removed and the bare spots filled in. The white clover seems to have been the most successful of the seed mix ingredients. Perhaps other desirable seeds will sprout in the coming seasons. Meanwhile, the lawn provided a good surface for late summer outdoor worship under the tent, in part due to removal of some very tenacious weeds last summer.

More than once, the team worked on cutting back the overgrown grape vines on the back parking lot fences,

only to be surprised later in the summer when our Mormon neighbors had all of the offending plants entirely removed from their side of the fencing! (Along



with the lovely old lilacs, which will be missed.) This removal totally exposed the back side of the church, which had become a bit of a dumping ground and was seriously overgrown with weeds competing with the raspberries. Many thanks to Felix and Dorcal for their amazing job cleaning out this area—it is no longer an eyesore!

Betsy is now quite familiar with Canada Thistle, which has yellow flowers much loved by bees but which is extremely invasive and was taking over large parts of two of our beds. As far as we can tell, all of these have now been pulled or dug out, with a little help from Ivan as well.

Fall tasks included Betsy filling her car three times with bags of mulch, which Ivan and Erik helped to spread on various beds. Trish and Chris also worked at cleaning up and rearranging the bed in front of the church sign. Thanks also to Laurie Brazman for trimming the rose bushes and weeding and mulching the rose bed, to Doug Donley for keeping the hedges trimmed and helping to keep the rain garden channels and drainage systems clear, to Marie LaFrance for always helping when she's in town


Preserving the Trans refuge state: Using your vote for Trans equality

FINANCIAL SECRETARY'S REPORT

Our financials are healthy and where we would expect them at this time of the year. Most of our income (58%) comes from pledges made by members with rental income of \$72,004 covering approximately 20% of our budget. Other gifts and miscellaneous income provide 4% of our budget and the UBC Foundation distribution is 18%, which includes (\$34,401) for the property manager position. This month the Foundation was the recipient of a generous donation from Tai Shigaki's will.
